# Take a railmotor ride to Tarana

Readers who remember the old "tin hares" or CPH railmotors which ran on country branch lines decades ago will be interested to know that the Lachlan Valley Railway group will soon be bringing their three linked CPHs to Tarana Station.

The first trip to Tarana will be made when the railmotors leave Bathurst Station on Sunday, May 17 at 3.15pm. They will arrive at Tarana Station at 4pm and then depart for the return trip to Bathurst at 4.15pm. The fares cost \$24 for adults, \$18 for seniors and \$12 for children.

A longer and very interesting trip will be made to Tarana on Saturday, May 23 leaving Lithgow Station at 11.45am and arriving in Tarana at 12.26pm. Passengers will be given plenty of opportunity to have lunch at the Tarana Hotel, inspect the heritage-listed station and surrounds before the railmotors head back to Lithgow at 2p.m. A one-hour stop will be made at Rydal Station before the train departs at 3.31pm and it is expected to arrive in Lithgow at approximately 5.19pm. The fares for this journey are \$20 for adults and \$10 for children. A package of travel and lunch at the Tarana Hotel will cost \$45 for adults.

Even if readers can't make it for one of the trips they are invited to join members of the Oberon Tarana Heritage Railway group (OTHR) on May 23 to inspect the railmotors while they are standing at Tarana Station for 90 minutes. This will be a great opportunity to see CPHs in operation before our own CPH arrives later this year from the ACT to run on the track between Oberon and Hazelgrove.

Keen rail photographers will have

The group then took time out to visit the wooden trestle bridge over Snakes Valley Creek and the site of the old Carlwood siding before inspecting the steel railway bridge spanning the Fish River at Mutton Falls. They were pleased to see that the steel bridge is still in very good condition and should only require the timber sleepers being replaced.
